JANUARY 11 – “Ohio’s Scenic Rivers Program - preserving Ohio’s highest quality rivers since 1968”

Heather Doherty

PRESENTATION: Ohio has one of the oldest scenic river programs in the nation, established in 1968. But what makes a river “scenic?” Find out with central Ohio scenic river program manager Heather Doherty. Learn about the program, what makes these rivers special, plus plants and animals that you are likely to encounter along Ohio streams.

BIO: Heather has worked in river conservation and environmental education for twenty years. She is from Ohio and received a B.A. in biology from Kenyon College. Prior to joining ODNR as the manager of the Scenic Rivers Program’s central region in 2016, she directed the Kenyon College Brown Family Environmental Center, and worked as a Watershed Coordinator for the Friends of Alum Creek & Tributaries.

BIO: David received his B.S. in Microbiology from The Ohio State University in 1993. He has been employed by the US Forest Service since 1992 beginning as a part time student and working his way up to a senior research laboratory manager. His research focus is on host resistance to invasive pest and pathogens and has worked on Dutch Elm Disease, Beech Bark Disease, and most recently Emerald ash Borer. Mr. Carey is also active in his community and has served on its volunteer shade tree commission since 2008. He is an advocate of using trees as biological buffers to make his home city of Delaware, Ohio a better place to live

PRESENTATION: Tim takes us on a journey of some of the amazing parks and locations within all 19 of your Central Ohio Metro Parks. While most everyone is familiar with our Metro Parks, this journey will educate on some of the more fascinating adventures that exist within the largest locally managed park system in Ohio. Whether you are a lifetime visitor to the parks, or if you have never been. We can guarantee you will learn something new.

BIO: Tim Moloney joined the Columbus and Franklin County Metropolitan Park District as their Executive Director in December of 2014. Metro Parks is a public agency serving the citizens of Central Ohio by providing a regional system of clean, safe, natural area parks. Metro Parks features 19 outstanding natural area parks with more than 200 miles of trails and over 27,000 acres of land in seven Central Ohio counties, the largest locally managed park system in Ohio. Annually 11 million visitors enjoy a trip to the Metro Parks. Tim has spent his entire career working in the parks of Central Ohio most recently as the Director of Parks & Recreation for the City of Upper Arlington. Growing up in Columbus, Tim has spent a lifetime exploring the creeks, ravines, and parks of Central Ohio. This addiction to the outdoors is now living on with his wife and two sons who can now be found almost every weekend exploring and getting immersed in the amazing world of the Metro Parks system.

AUGUST 22 – TOUR Exploring Scenic River & Aquatic Macroinvertebrates with Heather Doherty

Experience a scenic river. Take a walk to explore plants and trees in the river corridor and see how they influence river habitat. Once we arrive at the stream, use a net to explore for aquatic life and learn how the scenic rivers program monitors bugs living in the water as a measure of stream health. We will walk on the trail that follows the river, and getting in the water to demonstrate how we sample for aquatic macroinvertebrates (or bugs) to monitor water quality. I will demo this technique but if participants want to get in the river and try it themselves please dress and bring waterproof boots. Please remember to bring plenty of water to drink and a snack if you think you will need one.

PRESENTATION: Historically, butterflies were revered as the souls or psyches of departed loved ones. Today we know they really provide valuable services as pollinators, and are beloved as living ornaments in our gardens. Ohio annually hosts some 135 species of butterflies. We will describe and discuss the more common ones, especially those we are likely to see in Lakeside or nearby. Come and enjoy this colorful program filled with butterflies and flowers. You may gain a whole new perspective on and appreciation for these incredible insects.

BIO: Cheryl is interested in all forms of flora and fauna and fascinated by the connections between botany and wildlife. She is an avid gardener, tree hugger and life-long wildflower, bird and butterfly enthusiast. Co-founder of Flora-Quest, her work includes long-time leadership in Ohio Ornithological Society, Audubon, and Ohio Natural Areas and Preserves. She currently serves two land trust boards and promotes conservation as an environmental educator and advocate for nature. Cheryl resides in the Mansfield area, but she can be found with binoculars and camera throughout the state, ready to bird, butterfly or botanize.
